Division Update	Spencer L. Wong <ul style="list-style-type: none"> LMID staff is adjusting to the new location. Senior Managers have settled into their job duties and responsibilities since the reorganization. LMID is facing hiring restrictions and is hiring for limited- term positions only. The EDD's budget is facing issues; however, LMID's budget appears to be stable. The total costs of positions are going up because of the increase in the indirect costs. Neil Kelly <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Discussed the \$250 million competitive grant from the Department of Education. Mentioned the difficulties getting students into programs such as 3D Manufacturing, because parents are more interested in getting their kids into college. 																																			
<u>Economic Update</u>	Brandon Hooker <ul style="list-style-type: none"> In California, the growth of professional and business services; leisure and hospitality; and transportation, warehousing, and utilities industries helped push the unemployment rate down. The lingering impact of high foreclosure rates are contributing to the high unemployment rate in Nevada. In North Dakota the booming oil industry, bolstered by the Bacon shale formation, is driving the unemployment rate down to the lowest in the nation in November 2013. The technology trend is adversely affecting many unemployed older workers. Technology; however, cannot replace human creativity, critical thinking, and 																																			

	<p>management skills.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In 2013, the labor force participation rate among 16-24 year olds is lower than in past years. • In November 2013, leisure and hospitality; professional and business services; and transportation, warehousing, and utilities industries posted the largest job gains in Southern California. • In two to three years, the drought may increase the cost per unit of agricultural production.
<p>Estimates Delivery System Overview</p> <p>EDS Flowchart</p>	<p>Esther Ruiz & Diane Patterson</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Estimates Delivery System (EDS) stores over ten years of employment and wage data collected by the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) Program. • EDS produces custom wage estimates at the county level, broad geographical areas, industry, and business ownership level. • EDS allows for the comparison of local, state, and federal government wage data and makes estimates available outside the predetermined Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) regions. • The EDS system applies confidentiality checks to these custom estimates to insure that they comply with federal confidentiality guidelines. • EDS allows for producing wage and employment estimates by education and training level as well as producing wage estimates at various percentile levels. • The occupational wage data produced by the EDS system is also updated quarterly using the Economic Cost Index (ECI), making the data more current. • Products Derived from EDS: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Employment estimates by occupation. ○ Occupational wage estimates at various and custom percentiles (e.g. 25th, 75th, and mean). ○ Estimates by designated areas (e.g. MSAs, county-level, and customized geographic areas). ○ Sub-state occupational employment projections. ○ Staffing patterns (a list of the occupations employed within a particular industry).
<p>LMI Publications Evaluation Team</p>	<p>Heather Chamizo</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Publication Evaluation Team is tasked to look at all of the publications produced in the LMID to determine if they are still relevant to our customers, if they need to be updated, or edited in some way. • Project broken into phases: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Evaluate products on the “Publications Page” of our website (approximately 75 products). ○ Evaluate products in other areas of our website. ○ Develop standardized marketing plan for all new products and updates of existing products. This will allow our customers (internal and external) to know when we have new data on the website. • Products are reviewed using a pre-determined set of criteria, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Is the product legally required? ○ Was the product requested by a specific customer group? ○ Does the product target a specific customer group? ○ How many web hits does the product have? ○ Are customers still using this product?
<p>Regional Planning Information Packets</p>	<p>Justin Wehner</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • This group was formed in response to Senate Bills 1401, 1402, and 118. • The proposed product contains two components, a regional industry cluster analysis and an occupational analysis. • The product is planned to be created throughout the year, starting in Spring 2014. • Suggestions are always welcome on ways that would make the product more useful and valuable to the customer.
